## Dear Parents, carers, students and community friends, NAPLAN

Last week students in Years 3, 5 and 7 received a copy of their results for the annual National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests held in May. As a school we receive results in 5 areas for each of the 3 year levels tested. As outlined below, out of the 15 areas we improved in 6, declined in 3 and the other 6 areas remained the same (as calculated within a 5 point difference). Improvement in some areas was particularly pleasing with large gains in Year 3 writing, spelling and numeracy. If you have any questions about your child's results please contact your child's teacher.

The school and staff will be spending time analysing the data we have received down to year level, then class and finally the individual student level. Although these results compare our results with the previous year, they are comparing different groups of students. We also have extensive data showing the growth students achieved from Year 3 - Year 5 and also Year 5 - Year 7. These data sets are more relevant as we are tracking the same students and seeing if they are making low, medium or high growth in reading and numeracy. It was pleasing to see the high percentages achieved in both medium and high level growth.

## FESTIVAL CHOIR

A highlight of the school year is approaching when 49 students from Year 6 and 7 at Colonel Light Gardens Primary School take to the stage at the Festival Theatre as part of the annual Department of Education and Child Development's (DECD) Festival of Music. This year our students will be performing next Tuesday, 13<sup>th</sup> September. We also have 2 of our CLG students selected to be part of the orchestra which performs at a number of concerts and 2 other students who were selected after auditioning to be part of the dance troupe. There are 3 troupes across Adelaide, which rotate through the 10 days of performances.

Our school's performance is the culmination of 3 terms of dedication and sheer hard work. Students have been rehearsing every Wednesday since the beginning of the year. We are fortunate to secure so many places, as most schools of our size are usually allocated a maximum of 36 places. Securing the additional places is a reflection of the quality of our choir as judged by the DECD Music Branch personnel who come and assess each choir during the year. I would like to thank Marian Woodlands for her dedication and hard work in preparing our students for this occasion. It is a massive effort and includes many hours of behind the scenes organisation, additional practice sessions and follow up.

The choir has already attended a whole of choir rehearsal a week or so ago at Morphettville. This is when our students join with the other schools that will be performing on the same night to make a 400 strong student choir. **Congratulations to everyone involved in this amazing experience.** We look forward to attending and celebrating your hard work.

## DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES - PARENT AND CHILD WORKSHOPS

On the evening of **Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> September**, 45 children and their parents attended a hands-on "digi tech" workshop.

Last year, our workshops focused on coding. This year, we wanted to show parents how we incorporate tech into all aspects of the curriculum. All teachers use the Australian Curriculum to program for children's learning. Digital tools (ICTs) are used in every curriculum area. The part of the curriculum we refer to for this is called the ICT general capability. Skills are general with things like using social and ethical protocols (copyright, cyber safety, etc.) and managing and operating ICT (saving and backing up, locating information). **If you would like to read more about the ICT general capability, here's the link:**

The aspect of the curriculum that drives our teaching in using digital tools and systems is the Technologies: **Digital Technology area**. This is more specific in the skills and concepts that children must understand around the use of ICT, ICT systems, using ICT to solve problems and so on. **Here's more information about that area:**

## TOPIC 2 – HOW THE BRAIN LEARNS


We now live a time that technology allows us new access to the living brain and how it functions. Scientists can now study children learning and watch their brain activity including how it grows and the impact of emotion on the brain.

One area that has emerged in recent years and has stunned scientists is the discovery of what is called “**Brain Plasticity**”. No, this doesn’t mean our brains are made of plastic but it is able to change and grow. It used to be believed that the brains people were born with couldn’t really be changed, but this idea has now been disproved. Study after study has shown the incredible capacity of brains to grow and change within a really short period.

### What happens in our brains when we learn?

When we learn a new idea, an electric current fires in our brains, crossing synapses and connecting different areas of the brain.

If you learn something deeply then the synaptic activity will form a lasting connection, but if you only visit a topic once or twice then it forms a weak connection and can be easily ‘washed away’.

<p>Imagine riding a bike through a field of long grass for the first time – it’s difficult and if you only do it a few times it will always be difficult. Your synapse pathway is NOT well formed.</p>		<p>On the other hand, if you ride this path continually and regularly then the path becomes clearer and easier to ride upon. Your synapse pathway is well formed.</p>	
<p>This is what it is like for our brains when they are forming synaptic connections. The deeper the learning the stronger the pathway.</p>			

Synapses fire when learning happens, but learning does not happen only in classrooms or when reading books; synapses fire when we have conversations, play games, or build with toys, and in the course of many other life experiences.



