## Dear Parents, carers, students and community friends,

Schools are always busy places with wonderful things happening to enhance and complement the day to day work of teaching and learning. In the last few weeks, here are some wonderful opportunities students at CLG were provided:

## SPECIAL PERSON'S DAY

Our Reception, year 1 and year 2 students invited one or two special people in their lives to attend a singing and choreographed performance that has been 2 terms in the making. On Wednesday, two performances were held in the hall with around 250 special people attending each performance.
This was my first experience with a Special Person's Day at CLG which is held every 2 years. What a superb event it was. The students were so eager to show their special person what they have been able to learn and rehearse. It was a real privilege to watch each performance. The energy and enthusiasm demonstrated by each group, as well as the individual performers was a credit to the work of the early years' teachers. They worked so well together.

I would like to particularly thank Ms Coutts and Ms Pytharoulis for all the lunchtimes they gave up to help the speakers learn their lines. Congratulations Ms Woodlands for another amazing effort! You continue to delight and inspire the students, staff and parents at CLG with these events. We look forward to next year when the year 3 to 7 students will be involved in Lighting Up the Arts.

## CAMPS

Over the last couple of weeks, many students have been involved in 3 days camps. A couple of weeks ago, the year $3 / 4$ and year 4 classes went to the Narnu Farm campsite on Hindmarsh Island. The following week both year 4/5 classes had an amazing time at Camp Illawonga near Swan Reach. On Monday the 3 year $5 / 6$ classes and then later in the week our 3 year $6 / 7$ classes head off to Mylor Camp. The other year 3 classes will be going to Narnu Farm later in the year.
This will mean that by the end of the year, every student in years 3 to 7 will have been afforded the opportunity to attend an overnight camp. The benefits of this outdoor education program are varied and tangible. Camps bring classes and students together. Relationships are strengthened, barriers are broken down and students are able to view their teachers and leaders in a different light. The learning at each camp is tailored for each cohort of students and each program is dependent upon the individual facilities and offerings at the different camp sites. Learning is real life, hands on and relevant. It is amazing to see how engaged each and every student is in these settings.
I was able to attend and stay overnight at each of the camps and I plan to visit the camps next week. It was wonderful to see the students so engaged. The feedback we have received from the camp site owners has been extremely complimentary about the attitude and behaviour of our students and the school. Camps don't just happen. The planning, work and effort that our teachers put into organising these extra-curricula activities is immense. Teachers at CLG do this out of their good will because they recognise it adds value to the teaching and learning program. They don't get paid any extra to do this. They give up their time, home comforts and sometimes sleep to provide these opportunities for students. I thank our teachers in the primary years for being so open to these opportunities.

## STUDENTS LEAVING EARLY

After reviewing our current procedures in line with departmental regulations, I would like to remind all parents and carers that if you need to collect your child early from school for an appointment etc, you are always required to come to the front office and sign your child out. The admin staff will print you off a sign out slip that is generated through our EDSAS record keeping system. The parent or carer then needs to take this slip to the teacher or SSO working with your child. Teachers and SSOs have been instructed that they are not to allow students to be taken without this slip. If this procedure seems harsh or inflexible, it is a child protection measure. Sometimes it is not parents who collect children. Our school also has many split families, some with complex custody orders. This confidential information and emergency contact information is only stored on the admin computers, which is why parents and carers must come and sign out through the front office. We cannot compromise student safety. This is my number one priority. Although I understand it is not always convenient, it is required. We of course would prefer children to remain at school all day avoiding the need for this process.

MITCHAM $\begin{gathered}\text { * DONCASTER AVENUE FOOTPATH \& DRIVE WAY } \\ \text { CROSSOVER UPGRADES HAVE COMMENCED }\end{gathered}$

The grand old River Red Gums on DONCASTER AVENUE in Colonel Light Gardens have great aesthetic, heritage and environmental value. Protecting these trees is a high priority for the Council during the current footpath paving project.
New permeable footpaths and driveway crossovers will replace the bitumen footpath which has served for many decades. By using permeable concrete block paving the tree root zones will be enhanced by allowing rain to soak through, and they will lift the appearance of
 DONCASTER AVENUE to match other recently upgraded streets in the garden suburb. Using permeable paving will help to protect the trees and also reduce footpath maintenance costs, as roots grow deeper than beneath sealed pavements and so reduce footpath damage and tree injury.

* DONCASTER AVENUE works have commenced as scheduled today, June 28th 2017 and are are expected to continue well into July at best but possibly into early August 2017.
