The Colonel Light Gardens Primary School lap-a-thon was held a couple of weeks ago on a cold and wet Friday. On the day, I was so pleased to see almost every student in the school actively participating and improving their fitness by running laps of the school oval. I am sure many students achieved a personal best.

Last Friday at our whole school assembly we announced the winners of the physical activity and fundraising prizes, as well as unveiling the total numbers of laps completed and the grand total we were able to raise. I would like to thank the Fundraising Committee for all of their support and encouragement leading up to the event. I would like to especially thank Kelly Gilbert for her extra help.

The main reason in holding the lap-a-thon was to raise money to upgrade the unused Loovre into a kitchen and science facility. The previous best result for a CLG lap-athon was around \$12,000 a few years ago. We set an ambitious goal of \$15,000. I am thrilled to report that due to the hard work and generosity of the CLG community we have raised \$29,732.10. This is an amazing result and works out to an average of just under \$45.00 per student. I have no doubt that the prizes we had on offer helped with the motivation. We had almost 100 students each raise over \$100.00.

- the highest fundraiser in every year level
- the best dressed individual and group

So once again, thank you to everyone who helped with any aspect of our lap-a-thon. Every dollar raised is appreciated and will be used to upgrade this facility. Every child in the school will benefit. I will do my best to fast track the refurbishment so it is up and running at the beginning of 2018.






THE ART CORNER




























ROOMS 11 & 12 CELEBRATED NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK!

SAPSASA – ORIENTEERING RELAYS

Thirty one students from our school competed in the South Australian Orienteering School Relay Championships held at the South East Parklands held on the **9th August**. It was held in sunny, cool conditions perfect for running. In a lead up to this there were a number of training opportunities with the use of maps to locate controls around the school and Mortlock Park as well as information sessions on DIY courses and strategies. Thank you to the students who regularly attended

Electronic sticks were used for the first time at a school relay to monitor whether competitors had visited all of the right controls in the right order and also to record their times. A big thankyou to the parents who helped prepare their children for this relay by taking them to either do a DIY course or an Orienteering SA event before this. There was mixed success at this event with no significant placings in the teams that competed. Our best result for teams was 11th in the Primary Boys out of 27. All of our students' efforts were noteworthy as they endeavored to run hard and keep trying when they were unsure of their location.

Students were well assisted by volunteers from Orienteering SA who they could approach for help if they were lost or injured. On the results page on the Orienteering SA page there were some very promising individual results from at least six of our students. Please keep in mind students from Year level 3 up to Year 7 were competing against each other. I have included a table below of the standout individual results from our school.



The school now has membership with Orienteering SA. Students from the school can now enter events for free. Parents are encouraged to shadow their child on courses until they gain the confidence and skill level to do it by themselves. To shadow a child does not incur a charge.
