## **SOCIAL MEDIA - please be aware**

Already this year we have been made aware of 2 incidents of parents posting allegations of school yard issues on their social media platforms. On neither of these occasions was the school contacted about the alleged issues and when they were investigated the information posted was either half the story or completely incorrect.

I would like to reinforce that the school needs to be advised of issues or concerns happening at school so they can be addressed appropriately. If we don't know it is difficult to help. There is usually 2 or more sides to every issue and getting all of the information is important.

Make unsubstantiated claims about other students is not respectful and can have significant legal ramifications, not to mention the potential fall out in the yard. When parents get involved in their child's issues about another child, it usually doesn't end well. If your child comes home and shares a concern or issue, please ask them 'Did you report this to a teacher?' If they haven't then contact the school with your concerns.

## LONG SERVICE LEAVE

# Japan Junction - Where you'll find cool facts and info...

# This week's introduction: Sakura

In 1899 the Australian cricket team wore "gum-tree green" and "wattle-gold" caps and blazers for the match of the Ashes in England. This became the origin of Australia's national colours and in 1984 (yes, it took 85 years!) the Governor-General, Sir Ninian Stephen established "Green and Gold of Golden wattle" as the national colours of Australia on advice from Bob Hawk. The Golden Wattle was officially proclaimed as the Floral Emblem of Australia in 1988, Australia's Bicentenary.



In Japan, Sakura (Cherry blossom or Japanese Cherry) is the national flower which provides a jaw-dropping stunning view of the soft pink flowers. It is seen everywhere from March to May depending on the regions of Japan. Every year people pay close attention to Japan's Meteorological Agency forecast (tracking the cherry blossom front as it moves northward up the Archipelago) and people turn out in large numbers at parks, shrines and temples with family and friends to hold flower-viewing parties ( called 'Hanami') which was first recognized in the 3<sup>rd</sup> century to celebrate the arrival of spring.

There are other reasons that spring as an important season. March is the month of 'good bye' as school graduations are held and people retire. April is a month of 'new beginnings' as fiscal and school years both begin. In many parts of Japan the first day of work or school coincides with Sakura season. Most schools have Sakura trees in their yards and students in Japan feel embraced by the Sakura for these very special times each spring.

Sakura also represents the fragility and the beauty of life. It's a reminder that life is beautiful but that it is also sadly short. When Sakura blooms for a brief time each year in brilliant force (for about 10 days), they serve as a visual reminder of how precious and precarious life is. So, when Japanese people come together to view Sakura and marvel at its beauty, they aren't just thinking about the flowers themselves, but also about the larger meaning and deep cultural tradition.

I'd like to end with a snippet of this Digger's poem...

"My mother's letter came to-day And now my thoughts are far away, For in between its pages lay A little sprig of wattle" (A. H. Scott of the 4th Battery, Australian Field Artillery in 1916)

I salute spring in both countries.

# 2018 International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS)

Colonel Light Gardens Primary School is again offering students in Years 3 - 7 an opportunity to participate in the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) program for 2018.

ICAS assessments have taken place annually in schools for over thirty years and in twenty countries. Educational Assessment Australia (EAA), who design and deliver the assessments, is the not-for-profit arm of the University of New South Wales.

#### **ICAS is:**

- is an annual skills development assessment program in key areas of learning; assessments are available in a number of curriculum areas.
- gathers performance information through a 30 60 minute supervised in-school test
- · provides a continuous, independent and comprehensive record of a student's performance
- enables the progress of each student to be mapped in each skill against their previous performance, demonstrating personal improvement no matter the starting point
- uses fellow students' results as a reference point; results are mapped against all students sitting the test at the same year level in Australia
- provides an excellent preparation for national testing
- enables students at all levels of ability to participate; ICAS contains questions designed to specifically explore the abilities of students of all standards
- medals are awarded to the top students in each subject in each school year in each state when sufficiently meritorious and the test was sat on the official test date
- achievement certificates are awarded to all students at a range of levels:
  - 1. High Distinction to the top 1% of students
  - 2. Distinction to the next 10% of students
  - 3. Credit to the next 25% of students
  - 4. Merit to the next 10% of students
  - 5. Participation to all other students
- results are available to parents and students online; these online reports and analyses remain available indefinitely. ICAS reports indicate which questions were answered correctly, compare student performance to that of the other students tested and are highly suitable for inclusion in a student's portfolio for future tertiary entrance or job opportunities
- entries are administered through the school, so teachers can also access the information

## ANNUAL MATERIALS & SERVICES INVOICE (\$385:00)

The due date (Wednesday 28th February) for payment of all Materials & Services Fees has now past. Thank you to all those families who have paid in full, entered into a payment plan or submitted an application for School Card. To the remaining families who are yet to finalise their Materials & Services Fees, all unpaid portions are now past due. ## ANNUAL EXCURSION PREPAYMENT INVOICE (\$75:00)

The Excursion Prepayment Fee is a voluntary, not a mandatory payment option. *Please note that the payment due date for this option is Friday 13th April (last day of term one).* After this date, all unpaid Excursion Prepayment Invoices will be cancelled, meaning all families who have **NOT** taken up the prepayment option will be required to pay for excursion costs individually as they arise, as done in previous years, to enable their children to attend each planned excursion. (*N.B. the Excursion Prepayment Invoice can also be included in payment plans made for Materials & Services Fees.*)

## FINANCE WINDOW OPEN TIMES ARE CHANGING!

The parent body response to the introduction of the Annual Prepaid Excursion Fee has been positive and abundant, greatly reducing the time required for admin staff to be seated receipting payments at the finance window. With that in mind, the decision has been made to reduce the time that the finance window will remain open for cash payments. Currently the windows opens for cash payments from 8:30 - 11:30am, Monday - Friday.

#### As of Monday, March 19th the windows daily open times will reduce to 8:30 - 10:00am, Monday - Friday.

The early closure of the finance window only means we cease to accept cash payments at 10:00am, families are welcome to make card payments via EFTPOS at the front office, either in person or over the phone at any time during the school day... and don't forget that online payments via the school website is a 24 hour, 7 day a week convenient option for those who are unable to access other options.
