On **Tuesday 25th September**, 52 of our students performed on stage at the Adelaide Festival Theatre as part of the Public Primary Schools' Festival of Music. The Primary Schools Festival of Music, an official state icon, is a public school-based music education program which is a collaboration between the Department for Education and the SAPPs Music Society, which gives all SA public primary students the opportunity to perform at a prestigious venue. The commissioned work was entitled "Next Stop: North Terrace" which was a series of songs composed by local musician Mark Simeon Ferguson about the North Terrace cultural precinct. The concert ended with a spectacular sea of colour with the song 'Colour My World'.

In between the choir songs, there were a number of Assisting Artists from public primary and secondary schools, other choir items that presented different musical genre, and two pieces that specifically showcased the talents of the orchestra.

TEACHING UPDATES

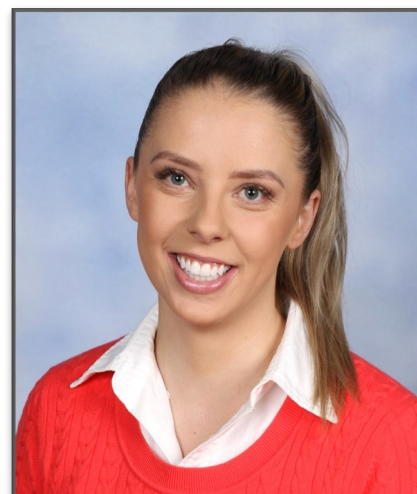

We have been making collages with our class teacher. We used a variety of different lined pages and incorporated clip art into this.

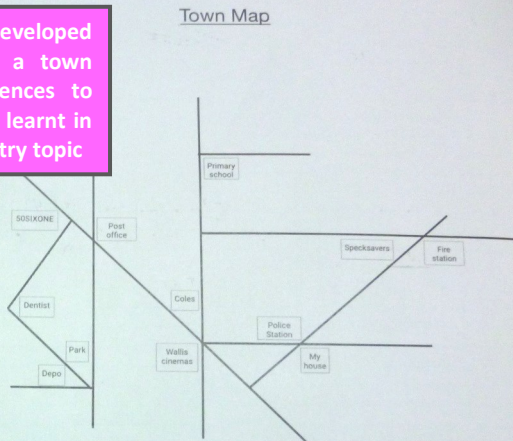

Mould growth on bread Practical Report By Emili Robertson

Page 2

Aim:

Which type of bread gets mould quicker? White bread or Multigrain.

Hypothesis:

If the white bread contains more moisture than it will produce mould quicker than the Multigrain.

Variables:

Independent-Type of bread; Multigrain, White
Dependant-How long it takes for different types of bread to produce mould.

Materials:

- Two air tight plastic containers.
- Two pieces of fresh bread (White, Multigrain).
- A sunny place (window seal).
- Time to wait (days/weeks).

Method:

Get two pieces of bread, one fresh slice of white bread and one fresh slice of Multigrain bread. Get two plastic air tight containers and put a piece of white bread in one and a piece of Multigrain in the other. Once lids are locked on tightly label the containers of which type of bread it is in case it changes form, once you label them place it on a sunny window Seal until one develops a fair amount of mould.

WARNING

Don't open the lid once it is closed as it might have started to develop mould and if you open it you could get sick from breathing in the the toxic fumes.

A Day In The Life Of An Ancient Egyptian Farmer.

I blink my eyes open to find the first light rays of the early morning beaming down on me, and I immediately sit up. I felt no exhaustion- there was nothing to do each night but feed myself the same old meal most farmers had and go to bed, so every night was a long and fulfilling sleep.

I dressed myself first. The same old linen kilt and my reed-woven sandals that were beginning to show their age. I had work today. It was Flooding Season. The flooded Nile has just recently gone down far enough for workers to plant crops. Today we would begin that slow process.

I left my small home in a hurry after a simple breakfast of bread and beer. Meals here were never very creative- or tasty, to say the least. The biggest difference I've ever had in my meal was when I was given a few dates and some honey to spread over my bread. I doubt many other farmers in this community get much difference, either.

I arrived in mere minutes, my home not being at all far away from my workplace. I was greeted briefly by the same faces I saw every day, and a ragged bag of seeds were placed in my hands.

Today was a long day. The air was hot, the only break we got from planting seed after seed was the time spend walking back to get a new bag to plant. The soil was muddy underfoot, a result of the flooding waters and an advantage to the crops- yet a disadvantage to the farmers working that day. My sandals didn't provide much coverage to my feet, and soon enough grit was slicked across my feet and in my toenails.

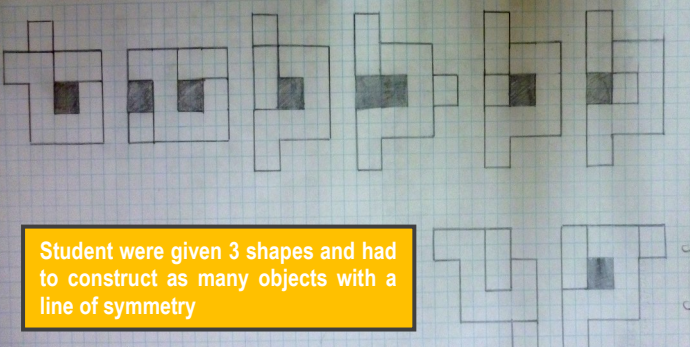
I planted too many seeds to count. Wheat, figs, melons, pomegranates, corn- so many seeds. Too many, almost. The fields were crowded with tiny seeds, all sitting snug and content under the soil.

It was difficult to feel relieved when the day was finally over. I was happy to wash off the mud from my hands and feet, but it almost felt pointless. It would only happen again tomorrow- I'd get muddy and overheated once again. Day after day.

Where you'll find cool facts and info...

This week's introduction: **Onsen** (hot spring)



Japan is located at the junction of 4 oceanic plates and is one of the places in the world most affected by frequent and sometimes devastatingly large earthquakes. In recent years the most damaging earthquake in Japanese history hit Tokyo in 1923 and resulted in the deaths of over 100,000 people. In 1995, a strong earthquake hit the city of Kobe and it killed 6000. In 2011 the strongest ever recorded earthquake in Japan triggered a massive tsunami along the Pacific Coast of northeastern Japan which killed nearly 20,000 people and caused a nuclear accident at a power plant in Fukushima.

Japan now has the world's most advanced quake-resistant technologies which protect buildings and also which results in bringing bullet trains to a halt before the first wave of a major quake hits. Having said that we all know we can't completely win against nature but we try.

So meanwhile we turned negatives to positives, made use of the geothermally heated springs thanks to active volcanoes, which is now one of the best leisure activities in Japan – **Onsen**.

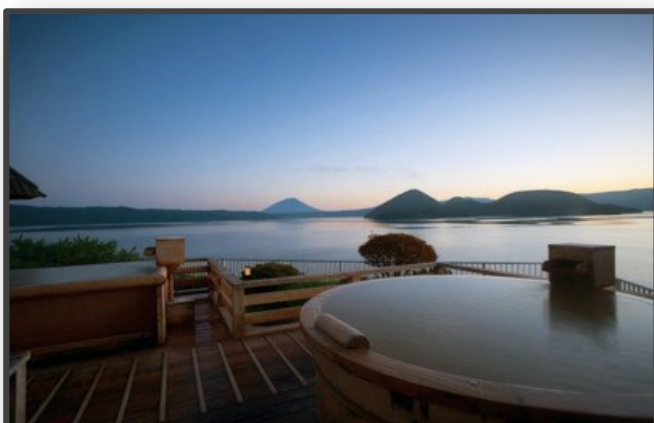
An **Onsen** is a Japanese hot spring. The term also extends to bathing facilities, Ryokan (traditional inns) and resort towns which are frequently built around a natural hot spring. Hot spring baths come in many varieties, indoor and outdoor, gender separated and mixed as well as modern and the naturally untouched wilderness type.

Onsen can sometimes be a multipurpose place to have a great time as well as enjoy food, scenery and hospitality, or they can just be enjoyed for their medicinal purposes, soothing effects on body and skin in a relaxing atmosphere.

Back home now...At 3:40am in the early morning of March 1st 1954, Adelaide had the second most destructive earthquake in recorded Australian history with its epicenter at Darlington. It had a magnitude of 5.6 which killed 13 and injured 160. Some sources say that 22% of buildings in metropolitan area were damaged including the General Post Office Clock Tower and many famous cathedrals.

In modern school calendars, the day was Monday Week 5 Term 1. I wonder what effect it had on our school community and CLG's historical Grange and Mortlock buildings on that day?.....

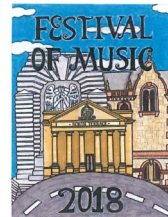
